Letter from the Village President

Dear Neighbors:

I am so proud of our community. We have had a busy fall already and we are accomplishing a great deal.

Our community endured substantial damage during the recent storm. We experienced blocked and flooded roads around town and had trees fall on homes and cars. We lost more than seventy park and parkway trees. Fortunately, no residents were seriously injured. Our entire Village worked together. Neighbors helped neighbors and we heard story after story about people helping each other. Our Village team responded immediately to the aftermath of this terrible storm.

On behalf of our community, I would like to express our deep gratitude to the crews in the field: Ignazio Fiorentino, Donald Betke, and Greg Chlebowski of the Public Works Department, Louis Maggi, Kevin Sohn, and Jaime Solano-Balderas of the Park District, Kevin Zeoli, Steve Hardt, David Steinke, and Tom Waterton of the

Water Department and the entire Kenilworth Police Department, as well as our entire Village Business team. Our staff served around the clock and through weekends in hazardous weather conditions as Kenilworth's first responders to the storm. We are a small Village with a small staff. It is my belief that the Village crews exemplified excellence, ingenuity and commitment in their storm response.

Now that Kenilworth has recovered from this storm, we are focused on the task of rebuilding and replacing many of the beautiful trees that were lost. I encourage you to read the article "Tree Talk" on page 6 of this newsletter to find out more about our Tree Replacement Program and how you can help protect and restore Kenilworth's tree population.

On a different note, I am pleased to report we have concluded our annual audit of Village finances and we are in strong financial health. The Finance Committee and entire Village Board have worked hard with staff to create a plan for the next three years on an operating basis and the next ten years for capital and infrastructure expenses. The Village Board acknowledges the Village faces increasing expenses and challenging opportunities for new revenue sources to aid in maintaining our high level of service and long-term infrastructure needs. The Village Board continues to work to address these future concerns as an ongoing priority for the community. This is being accomplished through our improved planning and budgeting processes. We will keep residents informed of work in this area and solicit resident input where needed.

It was presented to the Village Board at our October meeting and we have moved it on to the next step in the process, which is to hold a Public Hearing. The Plan Commission will schedule a Public Hearing in November. Let me encourage you to please plan to attend the Public Hearing on the Comprehensive Plan. It is an important time for the Plan Commissioners to hear your thoughts and perspectives on the Draft Plan. After the hearing, recommended changes will be considered by the Plan Commission and then it will come back to the Village Board for final approval. This is our Village's first Comprehensive Plan and I am very proud of the Commissioners and process we have followed to get here. Please participate in the process as it will be our roadmap for the Village for the next 15-20 years. (More information about the Plan is on Page 4 of the newsletter.)

# News You Can Use

## Back to School Safety

Kenilworth Village Officials and the Kenilworth Police Department would like to remind motorists schools are now in session and our community's children are walking and biking to school. Please be alert and drive slowly.

Students should only cross at the crosswalks and use the intersections where crossing guards are stationed. A bicycle helmet should be standard equipment when riding bicycles. As an added incentive, Kenilworth Police Officers may reward bicyclists who follow the Rules of the Road with a special treat when safe bicycling behaviors are observed.

Drivers should use the areas designated as "Loading Zones" for quick drop off and pick up areas. If you want to park to accompany your children into the school, please park in the areas posted with 60/90 Minutes Parking or Resident Parking Only zones. The "No Stopping, Standing and Parking Any Time Zones" will be enforced for children's safety. - Approved RESOLUTION Appointing a Director and Alternate Director to the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC). (Trustee James Hughes—Director, Manager Burke—Alternate Director)
- Approved RESOLUTION Waiving Administrative Appeal Fee Pertaining to Zoning Ordinance Fence Regulations.
- Approved RESOLUTION Awarding a Contract with Terra Engineering & Construction Corporation for the 2007 Trenchless Sewer Lining Program in the Amount of \$169,950 for the lining of approximately 5,260 lineal feet of sewer.

- Approved ORDINANCE Temporarily Suspending Right-of-Way Permits for Cable Television Facilities Governed by Public Act 95-0009.
- Approved ORDINANCE Authorizing a Special Use for Two Single-Family Attached Dwellings (335 Ridge Road) to allow the conversion of the existing four unit apartment building to two townhouses.
- Approved an ORDINANCE Amending Section 22 of the Kenilworth Village Code, 1959, implementing new parking regulations in the 600 and 700 block of Park Drive and 200 Block of Cumnor Road.
- Approved an ORDINANCE Amending the Kenilworth Zoning Ordinance 1969, as amended, regarding lot width and area and building size. For more information, please see article on Page 5 of this newsletter.
- Received a report from the Village Auditor and Accepted the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (Audit) for Fiscal Year 2007.
- The Village board accepted a RECOMMENDATION from the Community Affairs Committee to direct the preparation of a Request For Proposal for consulting services to assist in drafting a National Register Historic District nomination for the Village of Kenilworth.
- The Village board accepted a RECOMMENDATION AND REQUEST from the Plan Commission to permit the Plan Commission to hold a public hearing on the Draft Comprehensive Plan. Please see article on Page 4 of this newsletter.
- The Village board accepted a RECOMMENDATION AND REQUEST from the Building, Planning & Zoning Committee (BPZ) to permit the BPZ to hold a public hearing on possible amendments to the Zoning Ordinance pertaining to fee recovery. Please see article on Page 4 of this newsletter.
- Officer Earl Tuckman received the Police Department Life Saving Award commendation for his actions on July 19 regarding a jogger in distress. Lieutenant Phillip Brunell, Communications Officer Thomas Pozniak and Community Service Officer Dean Waxstein received Honorable Mention for their actions in this event.
- Lieutenant Phil Brunell received a Commendation Award for his response and leadership actions during a recent bomb scare.
- Trustee White was reappointed to the Police Pension Board.

# In More Detail: Kenilworth's Comprehensive Plan

The Village of Kenilworth Plan Commission held two Open House Events for residents to view and ask questions about the DRAFT Kenilworth Comprehensive Plan on: September 29, 2007 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and October 1, 2007 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Kenilworth Village Hall.

These sessions allowed residents to view components of the Draft Plan and ask questions of the Consultant, Village Staff, and Village Officials.

The Plan Commission held a meeting on October 1st in which they voted to forward the Draft Comprehensive Plan to the Village Board to request direction to schedule a Public Hearing on the document. The comments received during the two Open Houses will be taken into consideration, along with any other input received during the Public Hearing Process, in the development of the final version of the Draft Comprehensive Plan to be forwarded to the Village Board for approval.

The *Comprehensive Plan* is intended to serve as a "road map" to help guide community policy and decision making over the next 15-20 years for issues ranging from community character and aesthetics to redevelopment and open space. The *Plan* includes community goals and objectives, and provides guidance for implementing programs and policies to ensure that any changes in the community are appropriate and reflective of community desires.

## ***The next steps:***

### **Plan Commission Public Hearing** –

The Plan Commission will hold the Public Hearing for the Draft Comprehensive Plan in November. The Public Hearing is required by state law, and is intended to give residents the opportunity to comment on the Draft Plan before the Plan Commission makes its

# Recent Zoning Ordinance Amendments

## Village Board Amends Zoning Ordinance Provisions Pertaining to Lot Width, Lot Area, and Floor Area

The Building, Planning & Zoning Committee of the Village Board held a Public Hearing on Wednesday, October 3, 2007 at 7:30 p.m. to solicit residents' comments and opinions on proposed Zoning Ordinance amendments pertaining to lot width and area and floor area. At the conclusion of the public hearing, the Building, Planning & Zoning Committee voted unanimously to forward a recommendation to the full Village Board that the proposed amendments be approved. At their October 9, 2007 regular meeting, the Village Board took action to approve the recommended changes to the Kenilworth Zoning Ordinance.

The purpose of the proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance is to respect and retain Kenilworth's careful planning and development of its neighborhoods and update the Village's Zoning Ordinance by addressing the possibility of lot consolidation and re-subdivision in all residential zoning districts. The following is a brief overview of the amendments:

- The maximum lot width allowed for any lot shall be no greater than the second widest lot on the block. This recommendation is identical to the June 2006 recommendation made by the BPZ to the Village Board.
- The minimum lot widths for each residential zoning district are established as follows:

R- 1 Corner Lots	100' Minimum Lot Width
R-1 Interior Lots	90' Minimum Lot Width
R-2 All Lots	75' Minimum Lot Width
R-3 All Lots	50' Minimum Lot Width
R-4 All Lots	50' Minimum Lot Width

- Due to the change to minimum lot width for interior lots in the R-1 Zoning District, the Village Board took action to reduce the minimum required lot size for interior lots from the current 17,500 square feet to 15,750 square feet. The new lot area for interior lots is based upon the proposed minimum lot width for interior lots being 90 feet and the typical depth of R-1 District lots being 175 feet (90x175=15,750 s.f.).
- The Village Board eliminated the existing Floor Area Table for new homes, currently found in the Zoning Ordinance. The table is used to calculate the amount of square footage permitted for new construction. Since the table was implemented in October 2005, application has shown the existing table may, in certain instances, permit construction of a home with greater floor area on a smaller lot than would be permitted on a larger lot. Additionally, the floor area table for new homes sometimes resulted in a new home being permitted to have more square footage than a home built prior to October 2005, which was never intended in the creation of the original table.

As a result of these findings the Village Board amended the Zoning Ordinance to eliminate the existing graduated table and move to an equation to ensure that the permitted square footage for new construction is a linear progression directly related to lot size. The amendment ensures no new home is permitted to have more floor area than a home in existence prior to October 2005. The approved equation for the calculation of floor area for *new construction* is as follows:  $1200 + (.21 \times \text{lot area})$ . The Village Board did not make any change to the FAR equations for *existing homes* which is currently  $1200 + (.24 \times \text{lot area})$ .

## BPZ Committee to Consider Amendments Pertaining to Cost Recovery

At their October 9, 2007 meeting, the Village Board directed the Building, Planning & Zoning Committee (BPZ) to proceed to public hearing on a possible amendment to the Kenilworth Zoning Ordinance that would provide the ability for the Village to recover costs associated with the processing of zoning applications regarding requests for text amendments, map amendments, and applications for special use permits. The reason for the proposed amendment is due to recent applications for text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and Special Use Permit applications which caused the Village to incur additional legal expenses and expenses related to the use of

outside consulting services for such activities as engineering and storm water plan review related to the processing of such applications. At their September 25, 2007 meeting, the Building, Planning & Zoning Committee discussed cost recovery for zoning applications and forwarded a request to the Village Board to proceed to public hearing on proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance to add provisions providing for recovery of costs in a manner similar to that currently found in the Subdivision Ordinance. A public hearing has not been scheduled at this time; however, please visit the Village's website at [www.villageofkenilworth.org](http://www.villageofkenilworth.org) to check the schedule of upcoming meetings to see when the date has been set. The Village welcomes your input into these proposed amendments.

## Garden Clubs Lead Community Project

As many of you know, the Kenilworth Council of Garden Clubs and The Beautification Committee work to help keep our village one of the most beautiful on the North Shore. As in past years, they will continue decorating the village with wreaths and flags during holidays, holding a spring plant sale, regularly planting crabapples on Park Drive and supporting the public gardens maintained by the garden clubs. In addition to these long-standing traditions, they support special projects such as the landscaping of the train station. This past year they became involved with planting the new garden at the entry to the Kenilworth Assembly Hall, one of our architectural treasures and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

It was an involved project that should be shared with the community. In the fall of 2006, a dedicated volunteer and landscaper in town, Bogus Ostrowski, noted that the landscape around the Kenilworth Assembly Hall needed some work. Bogus obtained a copy of the landscape plan that had been designed in 1909 by one of the Midwest's most celebrated landscape architects, Jens Jensen. The plan was part of a larger report that was compiled in May of 2002 by Wolff Clements and Associates, called the **Kenilworth Assembly Hall Historic Landscape Report**.

The very first goal on the list was to "rehabilitate the entry walk, including a pair of hawthorns... and perennials within the walk." While foundation plantings were annotated on the plan, the front walk was simply detailed as "white flowers." The Kenilworth Council of Garden Clubs agreed to fund \$4000 to start the landscaping of the entry of the Assembly Hall. Over the winter, Valerie Foradas did research at the Chicago Botanic Garden's Lenhardt Library on what "white flowers" Jens Jensen had used in plantings along Chicago's North Shore. She also worked with the Kenilworth Assembly Hall's Jill Delaney. They used perennials that could withstand a heavy winter and incorporated plants that were already used in other public plantings such as those at the Kenilworth train station. The Sears School Benefit organizers arranged to have some of the old yew bushes in the front removed, and agreed to replace plant material there once replanting began.

The front walk took a week to clear. Friends, family, and neighbors in the community stopped by with shovels to help dig. The Kenilworth Council of Garden Clubs funds also provided for the plantings in the window boxes, two memorial trees to be planted in the spring, the preparation of two small perennial beds, and mulching. A rain garden on the southeast border of the club is currently being installed to help absorb water that pools. Friends of the Assembly Hall and neighbors that border Cumnor Road are funding this project. This KAH landscaping project has been a labor of love and each of us will enjoy the hard work every time we walk or drive by the KAH. There will be new opportunities to fund additional landscaping projects in the village and The Kenilworth Council of Garden Clubs encourages the community to support these projects in any way they can.

## Tree Talk:

### Village Tree Maintenance and Planting Program

The Village continues to be concerned about the replacement of trees lost to the recent storm, Dutch Elm disease, and the threat of Emerald Ash Borer infestation. As a result of the recent storm, the Village lost a total of 59 parkway trees. The Village asks for your help in taking action to protect and preserve Kenilworth's urban forest.



The 2007 Village Tree Replacement Program provides a smart, cost effective solution for restoring Kenilworth's urban forest. It will offer a choice of trees for planting on parkways and private property. The Kenilworth Beautification Committee has assisted in selecting the types of trees available to develop a balanced variety in Kenilworth.

Please consider buying a tree or two through the Replacement Program. If you feel you do not need to plant a tree on your property or parkway, please consider a tax deductible donation to plant a tree somewhere else in the Village. Any donation, of any amount, is appreciated and will help the community restore our tree population.

Residents should receive a copy of the Village Tree Planting Program form in the mail in the near future. If you are interested in participating, fill out the application and return it to Village Hall.

Tree and lawn maintenance is important. Water your mature trees once every month for 12 to 24 hours. New trees require slow watering once every week for 1 to 2 hours. Residents should avoid over watering. This can deplete oxygen from soil, stunting root growth. Automatic sprinkler systems are often set to water too often. Many sprinklers are designed solely for grass care, causing damage or fungal diseases to nearby trees. More trees die from over watering than dehydration.

At the first indication of any public tree concern, call the Public Works Department. Contact a private tree service for concerns about trees on your private property. Early diagnosis can lead to effective care and reduce the risk of spreading disease.

## **Important Information About Landscape Waste and Leaf Collection**

Weekly yard waste collection is discontinued each year in Kenilworth between December 15 and April 1. Residents are reminded that burning leaves is prohibited in Kenilworth and leaves are picked up by the regular collection service at curbside or in alleys where available only when properly bagged in special Kenilworth 30 gallon super wet-strength biodegradable paper bags available for purchase at the Village Hall and Ridge Pharmacy in Wilmette. No rocks, stone, gravel or tree trimmings should be mixed with the bagged leaves. Do not rake leaves into the street as the leaves clog drains and street sweeper. Since the leaves usually fall in a relatively short period of time, the Village appreciates your cooperation in properly bagging leaves so that the collection service can pick up and continue to maintain their regular refuse schedule.
